8. In Plaza Condes de Niebla. Ducal Palace of Medina Sidonia. XV century. Residence of the Dukes of Medina Sidonia. Built on an old Arab fortress, it consists of various styles. It shows numerous furniture, painting and decorative elements in the Baroque style.





10. Caridad Street. Along this street we find several examples of stately houses from the 17th and 17th centuries of the many that we can find in Sanlúcar.



11. In Cuesta de Belén street. La Merced Auditorium. XVII century.

Proto-Baroque style. Old church of the Mercedarios convent.



12. In Plaza de la Trinidad. Church of the Holy Trinity.
Century. XV. It preserves in its interior the sepulchral lauda of Alonso Fernández de Lugo. The Baroque image of Our Lady of Sorrows stands out, made of polychrome terracotta.



13. In plaza del Cabildo. Old Town Hall. It is the most significant building in its urban environment. Its facade is made of stone.



14. In Plaza de San Roque. Church of Ntra. Sra. de los Desamparados. Century XVIII. Baroque style. It preserves interesting baroque carvings.



15. In the Plaza de Madre de Dios. Convent of Madre de Dios. XV century. The beautiful cover of the Baroque style Lathe stands out.



16. In San Juan street. Parish of Our Lady of Carmen. XVII century. It was the church of the former convent of Carmelitas Descalzos.



17. Plaza del Pradillo. The facade of the old palace house of the Moreda (17th century) stands out.



18. In Divina Pastora street. Old Palace of the Marquises of Arizón. S. XVIII. Example of housing of Chargers of the Indies. The lookout tower stands out. Current Hotel Palacio Arizón.



19. In the Capuchinos square. Capuchin Convent. XVII century. It was the seat of the Capuchin Franciscan order. Like many of the religious of the convents of Sanlúcar, missionaries for the evangelization of America.
