

CYCLE LANE LA ALGAIDA PINWOOD

Is, for the most part, parallel to the path that crosses the pinewood transversely.



TALERO LAGOON

Coordinates: 36°50'50"N 6°19'5"W.

It is located in the Pine Forest of Algaída and borders with the agricultural area.

It is an artificial lake that originated in the 80s, as a result of the extraction of sands, until it reached the underground mantle. It has an approximate area of 18 acres and an average depth of 3 meters. There is a small observatory area from which you can see the rich variety of birds living there. The most common are the Flamingo (*Phoenicopterus ruber*), Little Egret (*Egretta garzetta*), Spoonbill (*Platalea leucorodia*), Grey Heron (*Ardea cinerea*), Pied Avocet (*Recurvirostra avosetta*), and the Glossy Ibis (*Plegadis falcinellus*), among others.

BONANZA MARSHES

Coordinates: 36°49'3"N 6°20'9"W



Located between the Guadalquivir River and the Algaída Pine Forest.

The salt marshlands occupy a total of 2,700 acres. The area is largely flooded and considered to be a natural habitat for many birds. The Salt Marshes of Bonanza have been traditionally exploited by the locals for salt production, being thus an ecosystem significantly transformed by humans.

A great variety of birds visit the marshlands during their migration period. The most common are The Black-Winged Stilt (*Himantopus himantopus*), Little Egret (*Egretta garzetta*), Common Flamingo (*Phoenicopterus ruber*), Grey Heron (*Ardea cinerea*) and Spoonbill (*Platalea leucorodia*), among others.
