



4. In Caridad street. Basilica of Our Lady of Charity. XVII century. Mannerist style. Seat of the Patron Saint of Sanlúcar, the Virgin of Charity. It was ordered to be built by the VII Duke of Medina Sidonia, Captain of the Invincible Armor, who is buried at the foot of the main altar.



5. In Fuente Vieja square. Rota Gate. Door of the wall of Sanlúcar, built between the 13th and 15th centuries. It constituted one of the four main entrances to the city through the perimeter of its wall. Remade in the 20th century.



6. In Puerta de Jerez square. San Miguel's Church. XVII century. Baroque style. It highlights its beautiful belfry, which is located next to the disappeared Puerta de Jerez.

7. In Plaza de la Paz. Parish of Our Lady of the O. XIV century. The Mudejar façade stands out on the outside and the magnificent coffered ceiling, its main altarpiece, as well as the side chapels, such as that of the Blessed Sacrament and images such as the Christ of Vera Cruz. It has a very interesting exhibition of sacred art.



8. In Plaza Condes de Niebla. Medina Sidonia Palace. XV century. Renaissance style. Built on an ancient Arab quarterdeck and residence of the Dukes of Medina Sidonia. Current headquarters of the Casa Medina Sidonia Foundation. It preserves inside the formidable Archive of the Ducal House. It has a coffee shop and a hostelry.

9. In Luis de Eguílaz street. Old Jesuit convent. S XVII. Example of the many evangelizing convents of the New World of which he was in the city. After 'desamortización' it had numerous uses; schools, barracks, homes and winecellar, among others.



10. On Gypsy street. Remains of the old medieval wall. 13th to 15th centuries. Integrated into the space of a school, from the street we can see the battlements of this witness of the medieval defensive architecture in our city.

11. In Cava del Castillo street. Santiago Castle. XV century. Defensive fortress of Sanlúcar in which the Homage Tower stands out, from where you can see a beautiful panoramic view of the mouth of the Guadalquivir river, as well as the beautiful Puerta de La Sirena. In it we can also see an interesting exhibition of ancient costumes, as well as an exhibition on the First Ciircunavigation to Earth.



12. In Virgen de Gracia y Esperanza street. San Diego Church. XVII century. Old convent of dieguine monks.
